

3 Months - 15,787 Observations - 1,735 Species - 1,106 People

This was the first year of the Pollinator Power Party BioBlitz - and it was an absolute success! Between May 1 and July 31 2024, 15,787 pollinator observations were logged, 1,106 people participated as observers and/or identifiers, and 1,735 species were identified. We also have ten winners receiving \$100 and an artist-designed t-shirt from Pollinator Partnership.

The Pollinator Power Party began in 2020 to increase awareness, distribute accurate science, and highlight the connection between people and pollinators. It grew into the World's Largest Party celebrating Pollinators and reaches 1 to 2 million people annually. In 2024, we added the iNaturalist Pollinator Bioblitz to the party activities!

A Bioblitz brings together trained scientists and citizen scientists in a fun, friendly competition to record species observations. Community science efforts like this help advance scientific knowledge and foster public engagement, enable widespread participation in the scientific process, and break down traditional barriers between scientists and the public.




