Without pollinators, these essential crops would not exist, and the production of many essential foods and resources, as well as the livelihoods of our ranchers and farmers, would be jeopardized. In the United States alone, \$20 billion worth of products produced annually depend on the pollination process carried out by honey bees and other insects. These products include resources beyond food, including fibers, spices, and medicines.

As key species to many ecosystems, pollinators are essential to maintaining the health and biodiversity of ecosystems and supporting the well-being of managed wildlife habitats and public lands, including state and national forests and grasslands. These precious environments provide timber, water, mineral resources, recreational opportunities, and enhanced economic development to communities across Texas, and rely on pollinators to maintain their habitats on working lands and wildlands. In order to ensure these ecosystems and our economy continue to prosper, we must protect these important species.

During June, a week is dedicated to raising awareness about the importance of pollinators. Across Texas, individuals, organizations, and communities work to educate the public about the unseen labor of our invaluable pollinators and how they contribute to the future success of the Lone Star State.

At this time, I encourage all Texans to learn more about how pollinators maintain the food we eat and the land we love, as well as about the roles they play in supporting our daily lives. By ensuring the future of this state's pollinators, we can help build a better future for Texas for generations to come.
